2010 First Capital Historical Awards Winners

In 2009 the Board of Trustees of the Ross County Historical Society founded the First Capital Historical Awards to identify, recognize and honor exemplary individuals and organizations that have worked selflessly to preserve Ross County's rich history. This year's (2010) recipients are the David Nickens Heritage Center (organizational award) and Edward Kunzelman (individual award).

The awards are presented each year at the Society's Annual Meeting held on the fourth Tuesday in April.

Director's Report, by Tom Kuhn

A raft of programs and events await us on our fall schedule including our upcoming exhibit opening on October 10, our Antique Appraisal Day on November 4, and the Fall Speakers Series (please refer to pages 1 & 3). We are excited to host the exhibit "Photographs of Occupied Japan, 1945-1946" in commemoration of the 65th anniversary of the end of World War II. The exhibit features an outstanding collection of images taken by Clarksburg native Solon Graham while stationed in Japan following the end of the war. His son Paul has selected 28 photos that best represent the collection, including scenes of villages, cities, and Japanese civilians. The exhibit also includes Graham's uniforms, war souvenirs, and the actual camera he used to take the original photographs.

Of course, the exhibit opening will also feature two other new exhibits including "Cooking Through the Years" in the McKell Library and our new "Ross County Hall of Fame" in the Museum. While the Hall of Fame is a more permanent exhibit, you have only until the end of the year to see "Photographs of Occupied Japan" and "Cooking through the Years."

Plans are also underway for our Holiday Junior Member Program on Saturday, December 4 and the Society's Christmas Open House on December 11. In keeping with tradition, our buildings will be decorated for the season, but this year will offer a new twist with an additional Christmas tree featuring over three hundred and fifty hand-cut paper ornaments made by Bonnie Grove in the Pennsylvania German tradition.

Ohio's Role in the Choice of Lincoln

Featuring Randall Buchman — Professor Emeritus of History & Archaeology at Defiance College, Defiance, Ohio

It was exactly 150 years ago that the people of Ohio played a significant and largely overlooked role in Abraham Lincoln's rise to the White House, including the competition in his own party from Ohio Governor Salmon P. Chase. Please join us in welcoming back speaker Randy Buchman as he discusses Ohio connections to Lincoln's nomination, ranging from the Mansfield News hoax to Ohioans who were involved in his Cooper Union Speech to the Ohio delegation that put Lincoln's nomination over the top at the national convention in Chicago. (The delegation included Judge Milton Lee Clark of Chillicothe who reputedly cast the very first vote for Lincoln.)

General Sherman Looks Back on His Life & Career

Featuring Frank Bullock, Civil War Historian, living history specialist and interpreter at the Sherman House, Lancaster, Ohio

Wednesday, November 17, 7:30 p.m.

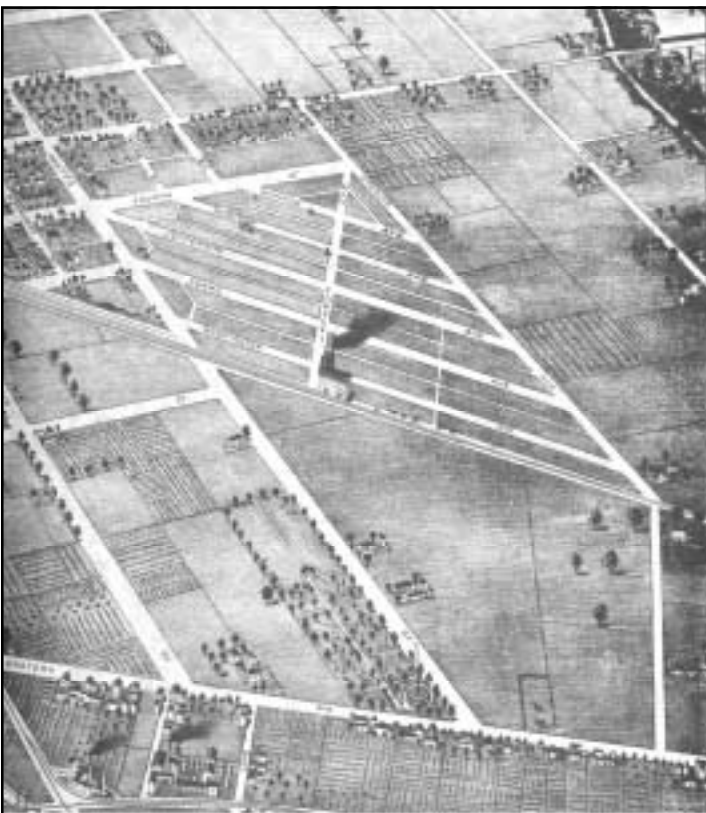
As we approach the 150th anniversary of the Civil War it seems only appropriate to focus a portion of our attention on the local and regional figures who helped shape the story. For that reason, we have invited Frank Bullock of the Sherman House in Lancaster to render his first-person portrayal General William Tecumseh Sherman. At the age of 68, Bullock's Sherman will reminisce about his life from growing up in Lancaster, Ohio, to his time as a West Point cadet followed by ten years stationed in the South, then his civilian career as a banker, lawyer, and school superintendent. His most important and powerful memories, however, will be of the Civil War and the union of this great country. He will conclude by telling about retiring as one of the most popular and public speakers of his time.

From the Archives, by Pat Medert

Trying to attract business and industry to Chillicothe is not a recent endeavor. These efforts have been going on for 122 years. In the archives is the minute book for the Chillicothe Board of Trade, forerunner to today's Chamber of Commerce. The Board of Trade was organized on Feb. 22, 1888, and the record of its meetings covers the period from the date of its organization to 1896. The purpose of the group was stated in a separate booklet containing the constitution and by-laws and the names of its initial members.

The object of this Association shall be to collect and record such local and general statistical information relating to manufactures and commerce as may promote the manufacturing, commercial and financial welfare of the City of Chillicothe, and especially to protect, foster and develop the manufacturing and other industrial interest of said city.

Before the year was out, the Board of Trade was successful in establishing a major industry in Chillicothe. Within a few weeks of its organization, four men—J. H. Stewart, John E. Rose, Thomas F. McClure, and W. S. Kelch—presented a proposal to the board for the establishment of a furniture factory on the city's east side that would employ at least 100 workers. According to their plan, the four men would purchase for \$40,000 eighty acres east of Watt St., between Fourth St. and the B&O Railroad line. The land, formerly owned by Henry Wade, had been platted by his heirs into 475 lots. The men would erect and equip a furniture factory on several of the lots at an additional cost of \$40,000 to them. They would get a return on their investment by selling the remaining lots for \$200 each.

The members of the Board of Trade were so impressed with the proposal that by March 31, they had an article of agreement with Stewart, Rose, McClure, and Kelch. Under its terms, construction on the factory would not begin until the lots were sold. The sale was to be done by subscription, with ownership of the individual lots to be determined by a lottery. The building was to be an L-shaped, three-story brick, fronting 100 feet on Jackson Street and 100 feet on the railroad tracks. Each wing was to be 40 feet wide. The windows were to have arched caps of pressed brick, and the roof was to be of slate.

The local newspapers kept the public informed of the progress. Most of the lots were sold by early June, and groundbreaking took place in the second week of the month. The construction was a boon for the local economy. One million, five hundred thousand bricks were needed for the main factory building, engine and boiler rooms, and dry house. These were supplied by local brick yards, and Litter & Son laid the bricks. Herrnstein Bros. furnished the lumber for carpenters hired locally.

On August 22, the drawing was held for ownership of the lots, and on Sept. 22, 1888, *The Chillicothe Leader* reported that the Arbenz Furniture Co., of Wheeling, WV, would occupy the factory. Work on the factory was expected to be completed by October 15, at which time, the equipment would start arriving, and before the year was over, it would be in operation.

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Frederick C. Arbenz (left) came to Chillicothe to take over the management of the company. In 1901, he expanded the business by establishing the Florentine Pottery just east of the furniture factory. It primarily produced decorative objects, including jardinières, vases, umbrella stands, and possibly spittoons with a metallic finish. The pottery did not prove to be successful, and in 1906, Arbenz changed to the pro-

Pottery Co. in East Liverpool, Ohio. The new company continued to manufacture sanitary ware for bathrooms. Within ten years, the company had ceased production.

In the fall of 1910, work was begun to re-tool the furniture factory for the production of automobiles. C. O. Snyder, of New York City, was brought to Chillicothe to be the superintendent of the Arbenz Automobile Co. Snyder, who had worked for the Hewitt Company in Detroit as a designer, was the designer of the car produced in Chillicothe. The local factory was an assembly plant; all of the parts were made elsewhere. In December 1910, the name of the company was changed to the Scioto Motor Car Co., and the automobile it produced was called the ArBenz. The first cars left the factory in March 1911 and featured three body designs — the four-door touring car, the roadster, and the torpedo (the first two models are pictured above). The name was changed again in September 1911 to the ArBenz Car Company.



In March 1916, Arbenz sold out to the National United Service Company, and in April 1917, the company replaced its production of automobiles with that of ArBenz light trucks. In February 1918, it was announced that the ArBenz Car Company would move to Shelby, Ohio, where the company would make farm tractors.

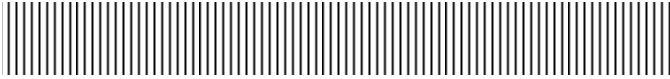
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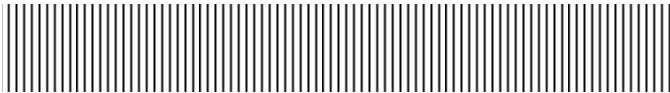
